MSNBC's Technology page points out:

While adults use online for research, news and to check out Web sites, kids tend to use instant messaging more.

Instant messaging is as common as e-mail among youthful Internet users -- and teens are almost twice as likely to use it as adults, according to Teenage Life Online. Jupiter Research reported in 2003 that 70 percent of teenagers said instant messaging was their favorite online activity. And three years ago, the Pew Internet Project reported quite a disparity among parents and their children over Internet use. While 61 percent of parents said they issued rules about Net use, only 37 percent of teenagers said they were subjected to Net time restrictions.
